We Are Commanded to Work

Work has been the way of life on earth since Adam and Eve left the Garden of Eden. The Lord said to Adam, "In the sweat of thy face shalt thou eat bread" (Genesis 3:19, page 6).

In these latter days, the Lord renewed this commandment to His Saints when He said, "I, the Lord, am not well pleased with the inhabitants of Zion, for there are idlers among them" (D&C 68:31, page 127). Modern prophets have also repeated this commandment, counseling members to make hard work "the ruling principle of [their] lives" (*Teachings of Presidents of the Church: Heber J. Grant* [2002], 115).

Family Responsibility

Working to care for our families physically, emotionally, and spiritually is some of the most rewarding work of our lives. Modern prophets have taught: "Parents have a sacred duty to rear their children in love and righteousness, to provide for their physical and spiritual needs, and to teach them to love and serve one another" ("The Family: A Proclamation to the World," *Ensign*, Nov. 2010, 129).

Parents share these responsibilities as equal partners and should work together for the well-being of their family. They should never expect anyone to take care of this responsibility for them. The Apostle Paul wrote, "If any provide not for his own, and specially for those of his own house, he hath denied the faith" (1 Timothy 5:8, page 1510).

We Can Enjoy Working

Some people naturally find work exciting, while others have difficulty enjoying it. But as we put forth effort to learn to love work, we can better enjoy some of life's fullest blessings.

Not all of us can choose the kind of work we do. Some of us labor for long hours for the basic necessities. And though it can sometimes be difficult to love our work, we can all find ways to make our work more meaningful and even find joy in it.

We can help one another in our work. The heaviest loads become lighter when we work together and share them with others.





Knowing that our work is serving God can help us find joy in it. In any honest work we can serve God. King Benjamin, a Book of Mormon prophet, said, “When ye are in the service of your fellow beings ye are only in the service of your God” (Mosiah 2:17, pages 148–49). If we can provide for ourselves and our families through our work, we are doing our part to help God’s children, and our work is important.

We Should Avoid Idleness

The Lord is not pleased with those who are lazy or idle. He has taught that those who are idle need to “repent and mend [their] ways” (D&C 75:29, page 136). He has also commanded us to work so that we can be both self-sustaining and generous. He said: “Wo unto you rich men, that will not give your substance to the poor. . . . Wo unto you poor men, . . . whose eyes are full of greediness, and who will not labor with your own hands” (D&C 56:16–17, pages 101–2).

True followers of Jesus Christ will not voluntarily shift from themselves the burden of their own support. So long as they are able, they will supply themselves and their families with the necessities of life.

The Lord promises great blessings to those who keep the commandment to work and are humble—“the fatness of the earth shall be theirs” (D&C 56:18, page 102).

We can be involved in wholesome conversations. We can invite others to participate in Church programs, meetings, institute classes, and Sunday worship services. We can make our living environment cleaner and nicer. We can do as the Savior taught and go about doing good each day. The Lord has abundantly blessed me as I have applied the principles of good works while in prison.

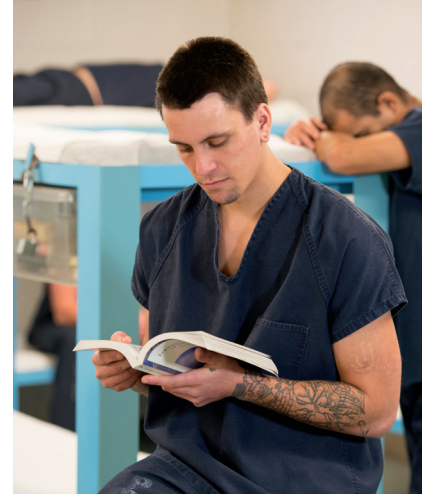
